Key Messages


- A low pressure system will impact eastern NC today and Friday, bringing the potential for multiple hazards including: strong winds, coastal impacts, heavy rain, and a tornado or two.
- Minor coastal flooding may continue through the weekend with high astronomical tides

Wind		Northerly wind gusts 45-65 mph expected along the coast, strongest along the Outer Banks	Coastal NC	Friday

Marine	<u></u>	Very dangerous conditions with strong winds and large seas	All coastal waters, sounds and rivers	Tonight into Friday night		
Heavy Rain		Locally heavy rain may lead to minor localized flooding	All of eastern NC	This evening into Friday morning		
Tornado		A tornado or two is possible, producing enhanced areas of damage	South and east of a line from near Jacksonville to New Bern to Nags Head. The highest risk will be from Cape Lookout to Cape Hatteras	10 PM tonight to 7 AM Friday


Key Messages

- Continue to monitor future updates and do not anchor on one forecast!






Coastal Flooding - Outer Banks



- Minor to moderate oceanside and soundside coastal flooding with inundation 2-4 ft AGL expected late tonight and Friday
- There is <u>potential for rapid water</u>
 <u>level rises for soundside</u>
 <u>Ocracoke and southern Hatteras</u>
 <u>Islands</u> Friday as strong North winds develop
- Ocean overwash may impact portions of HWY 12 in Hatteras and Ocracoke Islands




Coastal Flooding - Southern Coast and Rivers



- Minor coastal flooding expected along the southern coast and areas adjacent to the Neuse River, with inundation up to 2 ft agl
- Minor coastal flooding may continue through the weekend, with high astronomical tides




Maximum Wind Gusts



- Strong north winds with gusts 45-65 mph expected along the coast (strongest Outer Banks) Friday
- Isolated trees down, power outages




Heavy Rain / Minor Flooding Potential



- The majority of the area will not see ANY flooding impacts from the rain and this will be very beneficial
- Locally heavy rain may result in localized minor flooding this evening into Friday morning




Maximum Wave Heights



- Hazardous seas which could capsize or damage vessels and reduce visibility
- Large breaking waves leading to beach erosion



Severe Weather Outlook




- Damaging wind gusts possible especially near or in the darker green shaded areas.
- The area circled in RED has the highest risk for severe weather.
- An tornado or two is possible.
- Have multiple ways to receive warnings overnight
